A paraphrase is a restatement of a text in another form or other words, often to simplify or clarify meaning . "When you paraphrase," says Brenda Spatt, "you retain everything about the original writing but the words."

A paraphrase restates another's idea (or your own previously published idea) in your own words. Paraphrasing allows you to summarize and synthesize information from one or more sources, focus on significant information, and compare and contrast relevant details.

A paraphrase is a piece of information written in a new way after reading and analyzing a source. A paraphrase translates the main ideas of a passage into a new passage that uses your own words and perspective. A paraphrase lets you control what point or information is highlighted.

To paraphrase, you use your own words to convey ideas or information you have found in your sources. In general, paraphrases use approximately the same number of words as the original. When paraphrasing, make sure that your paraphrase really is in your own words.

Paraphrase is a merely the statement of the same idea or ideas in other words. Often a paraphrase will have more than words than the original. Its aim is not a concise statement of meaning, but rather complete clarity of meaning. "In a paraphrase" writes Walter B. Pitkin "you preserve the gist of the original article or lesson but none of its original form or phrasing"

A paraphrase is similar to a summary because you are rewriting the source in your own words. The key difference is that paraphrases include both key points and subpoints. Because a paraphrase includes detailed information it can sometimes be as long (if not longer) than the original source.
