Mills identified “troubles” (personal challenges) and “issues” (larger social challenges), also known as biography, and history, respectively. Mills’ sociological imagination allows individuals to see the relationships between events in their personal lives (biography), and events in their society (history).

The Sociological Imagination was written by C. Wright Mills in 1959, and he died in 1962 only three years later. He was a sociologist at Columbia University, and the goal of this book was to analyze the discipline of sociology with suggestions for improvement.

Wright Mills defined the sociological imagination as "the vivid awareness of the relationship between personal experience and the wider society" (1959:6). It enables us to "grasp history and biography and the relations between the two within society" (1959:6). In other words, it is the ability to understand how personal experiences are shaped ...

## **Sociological Imagination - Professor Lauren Griffin ...**

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As previously mentioned, C. Wright Mills is the origin of the term “sociological imagination.” In his 1959 book *The Sociological Imagination*, the Columbia University professor of sociology suggested that sociologists rethink the way they were engaging with the field. During his time, many sociologists engaged in a sort of top-down view of the world, focusing on systems rather than on individuals.

### **What Is Sociological Imagination? How Can You Use It?**

Essentially, Mills is making the point that sociology connects an individual's circumstances (biography) with the larger institutional context (history). Possessing the capacity to exercise your sociological imagination, to understand how your life is conditioned by social institutions, is empowering. This understanding allows you to take more control of your own life, rather than simply accepting the circumstances that were handed to you.

Summary. Mills begins *The Sociological Imagination* by describing the situation of man in the 1950s. He characterizes this situation as one of both confinement and powerlessness.
