

Present Perfect Or Past Simple 4 Perfect English Grammar

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Both fiction and non-fiction are covered, spanning different genres (e.g. science fiction, fantasy, thrillers, romance) and types (e.g. novels, comics, essays, textbooks).

Present Perfect Or Past Simple

We use the past simple for past events or actions which have no connection to the present. We use the present perfect for actions which started in the past and are still happening now OR for finished actions which have a connection to the present. We CAN'T use the present perfect with a finished time word: NOT: I've been to the museum yesterday. Simple Past vs. Present Perfect Simple - English Grammar

Both Present Perfect and Past Simple are used to talk about a completed action. The difference is the following: Present Perfect denotes recent actions and events which are connected with the present. Past Simple denotes actions and events in finished time periods (last week, yesterday, at the weekend, etc.). Present perfect or past simple? Jeopardy Template

With the present perfect the long time starts in the past and continues into present time. With the past simple the long time starts in the past, continues, then stops in the past, never continuing into present time. In this case the past is interpreted as a state or activity, not an action or event, so it's similar to 'used to'.

Present Perfect Or Past Simple?

With the present perfect, we cannot use a specific time in the past such as 'yesterday' or 'in 2008.' We use the present perfect when we talk about 1) actions that happened at an unspecified time in the past, 2) actions in a period that has not finished yet, and 3) actions that began in the past and continue to the present.

Past simple, past continuous, past perfect - grammar chart . Past simple We use the past simple to talk about completed actions in the past.. We ate out yesterday. (the action is finished) In a story, we use the past simple to talk about past events in chronological order; i.e. the main events of a story. When she opened the door, she pretended that we weren't there and she went to her room.
