The NCCN Guidelines for Testicular Cancer provide an evidence- and consensus-based treatment approach for the management of adult patients with seminomatous and nonseminomatous testicular GCTs. Testicular GCTs are sensitive to platinum-based chemotherapy, and patients have high cure rates even with metastatic disease.

8. Patients with a testicular lesion suspicious for malignant neoplasm and a normal contralateral testis should undergo a radical inguinal orchiectomy; testis-sparing surgery is not recommended. Transscrotal orchiectomy is discouraged. (Strong Recommendation; Evidence Level: Grade B) 9. Testicular prosthesis should be discussed prior to orchiectomy.

Testicular cancer screening. A self-exam is the best way to detect this cancer early. UMMC Cancer Center and Research Institute doctors recommend that, beginning in their teens, men examine their testicles monthly. Knowing the normal shape, size, and weight of the testicles will help detect any changes, should any occur.

Hold your penis out of the way and examine each testicle separately. Hold your testicle between your thumbs and fingers with both hands and roll it gently between your fingers. Look and feel for any hard lumps or nodules (smooth rounded masses) or any change in the size, shape, or consistency of your testicles.

Guidelines for the Management of Testicular Cancer

Testicular germ cell tumor (TGCT) has seen a 20-fold increase in the last decade due to the use of diagnostic radiation. More recently, direct epidemiologic evidence supports an association between diagnostic radiation and risk of several types of cancer.

The stage 1 testicular cancer surveillance protocol provides follow-up recommendations for both seminoma and non-seminoma testicular cancer and takes into account the administration of adjuvant chemotherapy. These recommendations do not apply following adjuvant radiotherapy.
